“Counting our Blessings”

This year, the month of May on the Jewish calendar is entirely devoted to counting. Each day we symbolically count another measure of barley to mark our journey from Passover to Shavuot. In so doing, we acknowledge several significant Jewish ideas. First, this period of 49 days, known as the *sefirah* (counting in Hebrew), reflects the anxiety of our ancestors about the outcome of their harvest. In learning from their daily experiences, we recognize the fragility of life and the interdependence between

humanity and the natural world. Secondly, we affirm the idea that there is a purpose and meaning to life. The ancient Israelites moved from political liberation following the Egyptian bondage to a state of spiritual revelation upon receiving the Torah at Mt. Sinai. This transformation is meant to model our own striving to build sacred communities that embody the values of Torah and the sanctity of all life.

The act of counting teaches us several important ideas for daily living. We learn that time is valuable and that each day is precious for the blessings to be enjoyed in the present. Counting affirms the notion of that real progress is generally achieved incrementally rather than in one major moment. Counting also enhances the qualities of persistence and clarity of vision regarding our long term goals.

Beth Tzedec Congregation personifies the importance of the Jewish view of counting for our accomplishments are the result of slow but steady progress toward our vision statement of “inspiring innovative learning, spiritual growth, and compassion to nurture Conservative Jewish life in the home, synagogue, and the community.” Every journey entails a measure of uncertainty as we experience times of joy and achievement as well as moments of disappointment and challenge. But, throughout the journey, there remains the underlying commitment to add each person’s “measure of barley” to create a strong and vibrant community.

So, please allow me to “re-count” some of the many activities that have characterized the year 5771 that began last September and which point to the direction we are heading in the near future:

- We have experienced 25 lifecycle events with 5 B’nai Mitzvah, 7 conversions and 9 weddings upcoming.
- Vibrant Holiday celebrations such as Pizza in the Hut, Simchat Torah bash with the Oy Train, Jewish War Veteran’s Shabbat, Purim Megillah Reading

and Party, Purim Senior's lunch, B'nai Mitzvah Class Shabbat Dinner, Jewish Family Service Shabbat.

- Caring activities that include the monthly Kaddish Grief Support group, the Todah Committee providing hospital visits and sending hundreds of greeting cards to members, Stupendous Soup Hotline that has delivered more than 20 bowls of chicken soup to ill members, and counseling by Rabbi Osadchey and Bobbie Osadchey.
- Creative and popular programs such as the weekly Keruv (Conversion) class, Rabbi Osadchey's "Walk with" Jewish Studies class, Downtowner's lunch and learn, the weekly B'nai Mitzvah Class, the World Wide Wrap tefillin program, the monthly Meditation Minyan led by Leonard Cohen, 10th Annual Jewish Film Festival, How to Sing Beth Tzedec Tunes and How to Chant the Torah led by Chazzan Edwards, Taste of Judaism cooking classes, Sunday Brunch Series on Conservative Judaism with Rabbi Osadchey, Jewish Camp Fair, Super Bowl Party, Wicks n' Flicks havdallah movie night for young children, monthly Yiddish Club programs organized by Sahbra Marcus, Rabbi Bradley Artson Scholar-in-Residence, Passover on the Prairies with Norene Gilletz, Reb Zalman Schachter lecture, and more.
- Community programs hosted by or at Beth Tzedec such as Smoothies in the Hut, 15 High School and church visits, monthly meetings of the Council of Christians and Jews, B'nai Brith Gentleman's Dinner, Theatre Calgary Dinner honouring the Hoffman's, Jewish Day of Learning, bi-weekly Erev Shabbat services at the Trinity Lodge, clergy led Erev Shabbat services at the Beverly Centre, Passover Seder at the Beverly Centre led by Rabbi Osadchey, and participation in the Judaism and Mental Health conference.

These are the almost daily blessings that we have experienced and can continue to anticipate as Beth Tzedec positions itself as the most dynamic and innovative center of Jewish life in Calgary. In the process of this becoming a reality, we count upon each person to add his or her vision, energy and resources to our worthy pursuit of building a *kehillah kedosha*- a sacred congregation that will inspire, uplift, support and comfort. As specific leadership and program opportunities become available in the coming months, I encourage you to step forward and be counted, in large or small measure, in shaping Beth Tzedec's future.

May all the worthy acts that you performed be counted as a blessing and source of joy,

Counting the Omer and Operation Solomon

This month, we commemorate two major events in Jewish history: Yom Ha'atzmaut, marking the founding of the State of Israel, and Yom Yerushalayim, commemorating the reunification of Jerusalem and the recapture of the Old City during the 6-Day War in 1967. At this time of the Jewish year, we also count the *omer* – the forty-nine day period between the holidays of Passover and Shavuot. According to the Midrash Rabbah, when the Children of Israel left Egypt, they kept a count of the passing days until the giving of the Torah; this counting connected the Jewish people's physical liberation from Egypt with our spiritual liberation at Sinai. Beginning the second day of Passover (the 16th of Nisan), and each day thereafter, we announce the day of the *omer* at the end of prayer services in synagogue.

Jewish history contains many other quiet landmarks which are not as widely commemorated as either the Exodus or the creation of Israel, yet are significant in their testimony to Jewish peoplehood.

Twenty years ago this month, Israel completed the massive airlift of 14,325 Ethiopian Jews – nearly the entire Jewish population of Ethiopia – over the course of two days, during the remarkable covert project of Operation Solomon. On May 24-25, 1991, thirty-five civilian and military airplanes flew back and forth non-stop between Addis Ababa and Lod – with as many as 28 planes in the air at one time. Each one was filled with as many passengers as it could carry. One El Al 747 cargo plane even set a world record by carrying 1,087 people at a time, the most ever in one aircraft.

The people who succeeded in this journey often had harrowing experiences to tell. “We walked for three weeks to Sudan”, recounts Leah, “and then waited for 6 months in a Red Cross refugee camp for the Israelis to come rescue us.” Years after the airlift, Asher Rahamim said, “Four thousand died in Sudan, and many living in the refugee camps there witnessed countless burials, [and] experienced starvation and disease.” Upon arrival to Israel, they faced challenges of integration into Israeli society, having to confront issues of

poverty, discrimination, cultural displacement, and recovery from psychological trauma. An active effort continues among many people and organizations today to better the Ethiopian Jewish community's situation, increase the people's profile in Israeli society, and acknowledge the remarkable gifts of the Beta Israel (Ethiopian Jewry) to Judaism and the world.

Through it all, the airlift to Israel continues to be viewed by Ethiopian Jews as a unique and miraculous event. According to Rabbi Yosef Hadane, "We came to Israel because we are Jews; we believe in one God, the same as all other Jews. Israel is for all of us... This was our exodus. This is what I teach at our family's Passover. So I say, after Hashem did such a miracle for us, what is our obligation, how do we thank God for this miracle?" (Years ago, I spoke to a participant in an earlier airlift to Israel, a Yemenite Jew who had arrived in 1950. He had grown up in a rural area where no one had ever seen, let alone been on, an airplane ever before. For them, the flight to Israel was a literal fulfilment of the biblical prophecy of arriving to Israel *al kanfei nesharim*, on the wings of eagles.)

As Jews, we continue to connect our experiences in Egypt and at Sinai. We believe that the privileges we might enjoy (of liberty, prosperity, health) are sacred gifts from Hashem, in return for which we bear responsibility for the well-being of others. Our connectedness with G-d, the Torah and our fellow Jews is fundamental to our Jewish identity. The thread between Operation Solomon and counting the *omer* is this very appreciation of the great gifts, and responsibilities, which G-d has granted us.

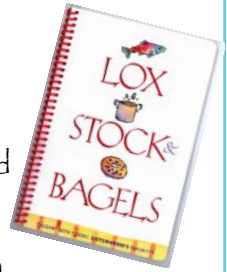

A MESSAGE FROM TODAH

TODAH AS VOCATIONAL BASKET WEAVING

No offense intended. One of the main things the Beth Tzedec TODAH committee does is teach caregivers to understand their ministry (service to others) *in context*. We usually think the word context refers to our surroundings (geographical, social, or literary for example) but actually that isn't quite accurate. The word comes straight from the Latin term meaning "weave together," and so a context is about how things interact, interrelate, and are woven together.

You could even say that ministry doesn't *have* a context so much as it *is* one. Like a basket. At TODAH meetings we want to explore how all parts of the work we do are connected, how the context/basket of one's own caregiving is constructed. Different strands and strips fit together in a myriad of patterns: theory and practice, theological and social/behavioral studies, Jewish tradition and innovation, vocation and task, persona and role, synagogue and society, the world outside and the world within. When perceived that way, there is nothing trivial about basket weaving.

Exploring the process and dynamics of ministry through the specific weave of one's own experience is what TODAH does. If you are interested in that kind of basketry, give me a call, 403-719-5755.

Benjamin Shagal

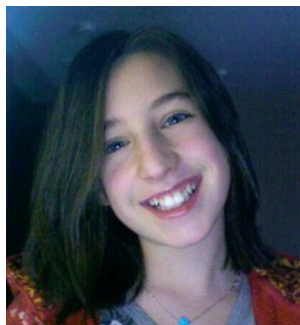

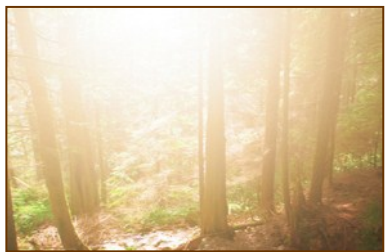
